10th Annual National Conference Held Local to LESO Headquarters

Attendees from 36 states, 4 federal agencies, and 1 territory flew into Kalamazoo, Michigan to participate in the 10th Annual 1033 Program National Conference held at the Radisson Plaza Hotel and Suites. State Coordinators were joined by representatives from local and federal Law Enforcement Agencies, as well as, guests from partnering organizations such as the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD), the Department of Justice (DOJ), and the National Sheriff's Association (NSA).

Conference attendees were transported to the Hart-Doyle-Innoye (HDI) Federal Center, the headquarters of the DLA Disposition Services and home to the Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO). They were provided information that directly affects their participation in the program and were offered the opportunity to interact with other members of the DLA Disposition Services team, including a briefing Ms. Twila Gonzales, the senior leader of our organization. DLA Staff from the Demilitarization and RTD Branches, as

well, as the Warehousing Branch, were also briefed the conference.

Annual Inventory Ensures Property Accountability for the 1033 Program

This year's conference and focused on property accountability. This will also be the focus of the next fiscal year.

Enforcement Agencies who have worked toward the completion of their inventories.

Tactical Vehicles, and Weapons were the main focus. Each categories completion is as follows:

A briefing was given on the requirements for the annual inventory as stated in the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between each State and the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA). Challenges faced during the inventory included dealing with 1208 property that was acquired prior to October 1996 and administration changes within an agency. This inventory is the beginning of the process to clean up the inventories of all LEAs enrolled in the program. LESO appreciates all the hard work by State Coordinators and Law

Currently, 62% of the states and territories have completed the inventory requirement, including required photos and any supporting documentation. 57% of the states have completed the inventory requirement, but are still need to turn in required photos and supporting documentation for discrepancies. 32% of the states have submitted most of their inventories and 11% have not submitted anything.

Aircraft – 51%
Watercraft – 87%
Tactical Vehicles – 36%
Weapons – 66%

If you have not completed your annual inventory or sent in photos and supporting documentation, please do so. Failure to comply with this requirement will result in suspension of your state or law enforcement agency.

New Website

At the 10th Annual National Conference, the LESO Team unveiled the new and (hopefully) improved website. We like to consider it a "one stop shop" for all of your informational and systems access needs. The website features the Property Search tab, which is where an LEA or State Coordinator may go to access LESO Automation. You will also find specific instructions on how to request aircraft, tactical vehicles, and weapons. There is a tab called Turn-In/Transfers

which explains both processes, links to the templates, and gives an overview of DEMIL required property.

The Forms tab is where an LEA or State Coordinator may find commonly used forms and templates. Please link to this particular page rather than posting the templates to an individual website to ensure the most accurate templates are being used. As before, there is a conference tab, Information/FAQ tab, Links, and a

Training/Assistance tab. The Training/Assistance tab is especially helpful to LEAs or State Coordinators who are newer to the 1033 Program. This tab contains presentations which are commonly used by the LESO Team to train new customers.

New Templates Standardize LESO Operations

As briefed at the National Conference, there are a new set of templates to use versus the old forms.

These templates are currently available online and will be mandatory beginning Jan 1, 2011. The following templates have been created: Application for Participation, Transfer Request, Turn-In Request, and the Inventory Adjustment (this replaces the Disposal Form). There

are also four new weapons templates and a new aircraft request template.

The new templates serve several purposes to include DOD and DLA guidance with using and creating forms, the name change from the Defense

Reutilization and Marketing Service (DRMS) to DLA Disposition Services, and to make each template the LESO receives uniform from one state to another. We anticipate many of these templates going away with the inception of the Reutilization Business Integration (RBI), which would allow an LEA to fill out these types of requests online, therefore alleviating the need for paper copies.

Department of Defense Activity Address Code Identifies Military Service

When screening for property, LEAs and State Coordinators often ask how they can find out which branch of the service turned in specific pieces of property. This is easily done using the Disposal Turn-in Document (DTID) number assigned to each piece of property.

The first six characters of each DTID number are made up of a Department of Defense Activity Address Code (DODAAC). Each branch of the service uses a different character to begin their DODAACs. Below is a listing of the characters and what military service to which it is assigned.

A – Army
W – Army
F – Air Force
N – Navy
M – Marines
Z – Coast Guard
S – DLA

We have made a minor change to the LESO Property Search Screen. In order to better serve our customers, we have added a scrolling photo application at the top of the screen. The property

shown by the scrolling photos is available for requisition by LEAs and is usually just a snapshot of what is available.

Please remember that property allocated through the 1033 Program is done on a 'first come, first serve' basis and that property on the scrolling photos may have a pending requisition. I highly recommend all LEAs use the Want List feature and let the system do the work. For more information on creating a want list, please visit Training/Assistance Area of our website: <https://www.drms.dla.mil/rt003/leso/index.shtml>. Creating a want list is tab number seven.

I leave you with this final note, "Property Accountability". LESO can't stress this enough. If you receive property with a DEMIL code of B-G it is yours to use as long as you wish. However, when your agency no longer needs this property it must be turned in to the Nearest DLA Disposition Services site or transferred to another Law Enforcement Agency. DEMIL A and Q/6 are yours to keep after one calendar year of receipt. For more information on this, please contact your State Coordinator. Federal LEAs should contact LESO directly.

Weapons Team (Mr. Tom Gawenda and Ms. Kylee Rosso)

As many State Coordinators and LEAs have found out, the process to request a weapon through the 1033 Program is extensive. It can take anywhere from 6-9 months from the time an LEA requests a weapon to them to take physical custody of it. With the inventory at 66%, LEAs are finding that they have excess weapons that they no longer need.

If the weapon is in good condition and is still functioning, LESO encourages State Coordinators to transfer weapons within their state to LEAs that are waiting

for a request to be filled. This option allows for LEAs in possession of excess weapons to reduce their numbers while allowing LEAs waiting for weapons to receive them in a more timely manner. If there isn't a need for a specific weapon in state, LESO will assist in coordinating the transfer to an agency located in another state.

Transferring weapons is a win-win for the LEAs, State Coordinators, and LESO. It reduces the accountability for one agency, while giving another agency the weapons it needs to

complete mission requirements. It also reduces the time and cost that come with waiting for weapons to be shipped.

Returning the weapon to Anniston Army Depot should be a last resort when it is no longer functioning property or is damaged.

Aircraft/Watercraft Team, (Ms. Kelly Cuel and Mr. Ron Chavis)

On March 24, 2010, the Houston SWAT team greeted an Air Force T-43 at the George Bush Intercontinental Airport in Houston, TX. The aircrew deplaned, shook hands with the members of the SWAT team, and signed over the T-43.

Earlier in the year, the LESO Aircraft Lead was contacted regarding the excess T-43. The Houston SWAT team explained how this aircraft (which is equivalent to a civilian Boeing 737-200) would be reconstructed on the inside to mock a commercial airliner and that they would conduct anti-terrorism drills and train neighboring SWAT

teams. The Aircraft Lead worked with the Air Force to transfer the \$5.4 million aircraft from military service to the Houston SWAT team through the 1033 Program.

The transfer actually saved money because the aircraft was destined to take its final flight to the 309th Aerospace Maintenance and Regeneration Group (AMARG) in Tucson, AZ where it would have been drained of fluids, parked, and stored for years to come.

This was a huge benefit to the Air Force, the Houston SWAT team, the Houston Police Department, and

the American taxpayer.

As mentioned at the National Conference, if anyone is interested in obtaining an aircraft for a similar mission, the Air Force expects to declare three C-9 (a military version of the DC-9 airliner) as excess late Fiscal Year 2011.

Coming Soon: 3 U.S. Air Force DC-9s

Tactical Vehicle Team (Ms. Cassie Madden and Ms. Deb Smith)

As stated at the 10th Annual National Conference, the Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) does not have a National Priority List for allocating tactical vehicles.

Currently, all vehicles are requisitioned like all other property. This can be done through an electronic requisition online or by physically screening the property at a DLA Disposition Services field site and submitting a DRMS Form 103. The Vehicle Team will allocate all Armored Vehicles and HMMWV's to LESO customers using the

following criteria:

- Priority given for Counter Terrorism and Counter Drug use
- Quantity of Tactical Vehicles already maintained by Law Enforcement Agency (LEA)
- When necessary, use equitable distribution

Turn in/Transfer Vehicles:

If you have any vehicle on your property book and it is not DEMIL A OR Q (6), it MUST be turned in to a DLA Disposition Services Site or transferred to

another LEA when it is no longer needed by your agency. DO NOT attempt to DEMIL this property yourself. LEAs are not authorized to perform any DEMIL on property acquired through the 1033 Program. All DEMIL property must receive a DEMIL certification signed by both an authorized certifier and an authorized verifier. This can only be performed at an authorized DLA Disposition Service Site.

1033 Program Success Story

Ulster County Sheriff's Department (Kingston, New York)

On Thursday, Sept. 30 DLA Disposition Services at Ft. Drum, N.Y. issued two Army HMMWVs to the Ulster County Sherriff's Department based in Kingston, New York through the 1033 program. As the HMMWVs were returning to the sheriff's department headquarters near New York City, a massive rainstorm hit the East Coast and is being blamed for eight deaths.

According to Bill Holt of the New York Division of

Criminal Justices Services, one HMMWV was immediately used during the flood for water rescues. Mr. Holt works as a liaison between the DLA Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) and agencies in the state of New York.

Ulster County Sherriff's Lt. Eric Benjamin wrote in an email to Mr. Holt that the vehicle, still in its Army green paint job, "was pressed into service with the Sherriff's in-water

rescue team for major flooding and evacuations and was instrumental in several rescues!"

Wilson County Sheriff's Department (Fredonia, Kansas)

On October 7, 2010, while on a routine patrol a deputy with the Wilson County Sheriff's Department in Fredonia, Kansas, responded to a call from a female motorist. The motorist stated that she thought her car had been hit by a bullet while driving down the highway.

When the deputy arrived on scene, he approached a car he thought might be the motorists. The driver of the car pulled out a

pistol and pointed it at the deputy. The situation became an armed confrontation between the driver of the vehicle and the deputies of the Wilson County Sheriff's Department.

With equipment provided through the 1033 Program, Wilson County Deputies were able to end the confrontation and protect not only their own lives, but the lives of innocent motorists.
