

This letter is to confirm the mutual intent of both the State of Louisiana, Office of Community Development, Disaster Recovery Unit (OCD-DRU) and Terrebonne Parish Consolidated Government to collaborate and enter into a partner agreement contingent upon the award of funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Community Development Block Grant National Disaster Resilience (CDBG-NDR) competition, to carry out eligible activities as provided in the OCD-DRU CDBG-NDR application.

Terrebonne Parish is a consolidated government near the Gulf of Mexico. The Parish is an entitlement community managing HUD funds to repair storm damaged housing and provide safe, affordable housing to the low to moderate income residents. This professional staff has decades of experience. The Parish is also managing \$135M in CDBG disaster related funds with a professional staff dedicated to that effort. The Finance Division has all of the appropriate policies and procedures in place for CDBG entitlement and disaster funding. We have been fortunate to have a good partner in the state to assist in the development of both the staff capacity and the grant specific knowledge base.

The loss of sediment from the Mississippi River has created land loss exacerbated by extreme weather events to erode our coastline. The land loss has been significant and the Parish has responded with a multifaceted planning approach to adapt. These efforts include building levees, elevating houses, providing housing on higher ground, and acquisitions. Staff, including the Recovery Planner, the Building Code Official/Assistant Director, and the Director of the Department of Planning and Zoning are cooperating with the state and nonprofits in assessing the situation and recommended endorsing projects for this funding. These individuals would provide similar technical assistance should a project be funded. The Parish recovery and finance staff will monitor the activities for concurrence with OCD/HUD guidance.

At this time, Louisiana Sea Grant appreciates early engagement in the process to develop an application to HUD. LSG conducts efforts to enhance the resilience of Louisiana's coastal communities through projects including harbor of refuge for vessels, direct seafood marketing for commercial fishermen, and homeowner education on hazard resilience. 

Plaquemines Parish, within the past 14 years, has faced a number of substantial and unique challenges. We have been the victim of Hurricanes Katrina, Rita, Gustav, and Isaac. In 2010 the Deepwater Horizon oil rig exploded south of Venice and dumped hundreds of millions of gallons of oil into the Gulf of Mexico, with devastating impact to Plaquemines' extensive coastline. Recovery in Plaquemines has been significantly complicated by this man-made disaster as well natural disasters. In order for Plaquemines Parish to survive in a sustainable manner, we must address housing elevation issues, rebuilding lost coastline and levee enhancement, in conjunction increased capacity of pump stations.

As a subrecipient of NDRC funding, Plaquemines Parish staff would work with OCD-DRU, or its designated agent, to accomplish the combined goals of both the parish and state. There is a documented need within the parish for affordable, sustainable housing, levee enhancement, environmental restoration and infrastructure augmentation and improvement.

This letter is to confirm the mutual intent of both the State of Louisiana, Office of Community Development, Disaster Recovery Unit (OCD-DRU) and Lafourche Parish Government to collaborate and enter into a partner agreement [or other agreement], contingent upon the award of funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for the Community Development Block Grant National Disaster Resilience (CDBG-NDR) competition, to carry out eligible activities as provided in the OCD-DRU CDBG-NDR application.

Lafourche Parish Government has for the last 12 years concentrated our efforts on making our communities more resilient by utilizing parish dollars, in combination with federal and state funds, to construct public works projects. We have over the years acquired 10 repetitive flood loss homes. These project allowed us to move homeowners to less flood-prone areas of our parish while opening up green space to allow expanded drainage opportunities. We have also elevated 15 homes allowing homeowners to be above the new Digital Flood Insurance Rate Map (DFIRM) elevations. This allowed them to get better rates on their flood insurance while allowing them to not worry about flooding. We have invested more than \$15 million in upgrading and constructing new pump stations. This has provided extra pumping capacity to allow water to evacuate neighborhoods faster. We have also invested in expanding seawalls and raising levees to provide expanded flood protection for our parish.

We would propose that this partnership be a sub-recipient relationship. The parish can provide in-house project management and administrative services that would allow the project to move at a



## **Appendix F**

### **Certification**

a. h. The grantee certifies that it is following a detailed citizen participation plan that satisfies the requirements of 24 CFR 91.105 or 91.115, as applicable (except as provided for in notices providing waivers and alternative requirements for this grant). Also, each UGLG receiving assistance from a State grantee must follow a detailed citizen participation plan that satisfies the requirements of 24 CFR 570.486 (except as provided for in notices providing waivers and alternative requirements for this grant).

i. Each State receiving a direct award under this Notice certifies that it has consulted with affected UGLGs in counties designated in covered major disaster declarations in the non-entitlement, entitlement, and tribal areas of the State in determining the uses of funds, including method of distribution of funding, or activities carried out directly by the State.

j. The grantee certifies that it is complying with each of the following criteria:

(1) Funds will be used solely for necessary expenses related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restoration of infrastructure and housing, and economic revitalization in the most impacted and distressed areas for which the President declared a major disaster in the aftermath of an event occurring in 2011, 2012, or 2013, pursuant to the Stafford Act.

(2) With respect to activities expected to be assisted with CDBG-NDR funds, the

Application has been developed so as to give the maximum feasible priority to activities that will benefit low- and moderate-income families.

(3) The aggregate use of CDBG-NDR funds shall principally benefit low- and moderate-income families in a manner that ensures that at least 50 percent of the grant amount is expended for activities that benefit such persons, unless waived by HUD based on a finding of compelling need.

(4) The grantee will not attempt to recover any capital costs of public improvements assisted with CDBG-NDR grant funds, by assessing any amount against properties owned and occupied by persons of low- and moderate-income, including any fee charged or assessment made as a condition of obtaining access to such public improvements, unless: (a) disaster recovery grant funds are used to pay the proportion of such fee or assessment that relates to the capital costs of such public improvements that are financed from revenue sources other than under this title; or (b) for purposes of assessing any amount against properties owned and occupied by persons of moderate income, the grantee certifies to the Secretary that it lacks sufficient CDBG funds (in any form) to comply with the requirements of clause (a).

k. The grantee certifies that it (and any subrecipient or recipient) will conduct and carry out the grant in conformity with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d) and the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601-3619) and implementing regulations.

l. The grantee certifies that it has adopted and is enforcing the following policies. In addition, a State receiving a direct award must certify that it will require any UGLG that receives grant funds to certify that it has adopted and is enforcing:

(1) A policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in nonviolent civil rights demonstrations; and

(2) A policy of enforcing applicable State and local laws against physically barring entrance to or exit from a facility or location that is the subject of such nonviolent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction.

in a timely manner; or the State or UGLG will develop a plan to increase capacity where such capacity is lacking.

n. The grantee will not use grant funds for any activity in an area delineated as a special flood hazard area or equivalent in FEMA's most recent and current data source unless it also ensures that the action is designed or modified to minimize harm to or within the floodplain in accordance with Executive Order 11988 and 24 CFR part 55. The relevant data source for this provision is the latest issued FEMA data or guidance, which includes advisory data (such as Advisory Base Flood Elevations) or preliminary and final Flood Insurance Rate Maps.

o. The grantee certifies that its activities concerning lead-based paint will comply with the requirements of 24 CFR part 35, subparts A, B, J, K, and R.



### *Public Comment and Public Meeting Requirement*

In conjunction with its Phase I application submission, the State of Louisiana posted its application for a 15-day public comment period, from March 6 through March 20. Additionally, the state held two public meetings during this comment period, the first in LaPlace, LA, on March 10 and a second on March 18 in Mathews, LA. The former was held at the request of the St. John the Baptist Parish government, while the latter was specifically held in a locale central to the four target areas presented by the state's application, and met the public meeting requirement outlined by the NDRC NOFA.

To advertise the public comment period and public meetings, OCD-DRU utilized press releases and direct e-mail blasts through its own distribution list. In addition, each of the four parishes included in this Phase I application, St. John the Baptist, Plaquemines, Lafourche, and Terrebonne sent mailers to its own constituents through their own communications systems.

## National Disaster Resilience Competition

On June 14, 2014, President Obama announced the National Disaster Resilience Competition (NDRC), in which states that have experienced a presidentially-declared major disaster in 2011, 2012 or 2013 can compete for nearly \$1 billion to help communities rebuild and increase their resilience.

Louisiana is one of the states eligible to compete for \$820 million of \$1 billion, which are available through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery funds from the Disaster Relief Appropriations Act of 2013.

On Sept. 17, 2014, HUD officially launched the competition, which promotes risk assessment and planning and will fund the implementation of innovative resilience projects to better prepare communities for future storms and other extreme events. All successful applicants will need to tie their proposals to the eligible disaster(s) from which they are recovering.

To collect public comments and input on-site, the state developed and utilized a series of worksheets targeting both the general public and specific stakeholder groups. In total, 14 completed worksheets were collected through this process and have been attached here for reference. Additionally, two comments were received via e-mail and have also been attached.

### I. Non-Stakeholder Specific Worksheets

Of the 14 total worksheet responses collected, three were non-specific and referred to general community resilience. All three worksheets cited the need for further flood protection systems, with two worksheets referring to either the need for additional levees, or a general fear that local levee systems may not be adequate. One worksheet response cited inadequate local sewage and water treatment systems and poor water quality attributable to saltwater intrusion. This response also noted the need for sufficient infrastructure prior to new residential development.

Additionally, two worksheet responses referred to social vulnerabilities. Specifically, one response cited the strong community bonds needed to both respond to disasters in isolation and to build resilience over a longer period of time. One response noted high instances of poverty in their community coupled with educational limitations, requiring the need for proactive interventions, stating, “These residents need agencies to go into their communities and offer help. Agencies should not expect everyone in need to go to them.”

## **II. Resident Stakeholder Discussion Worksheets**

Six of the 14 worksheet responses were specific to “resident stakeholders.” Of these responses, four specifically noted the state’s unique culture as relative communal strengths, while three cited its ecosystem, environment or natural resources. Three responses cited a lack of public resources in vulnerable areas as specific risks. Two of these responses noted either a lack of public services (e.g. medical clinics, churches, community colleges) or a strain on existing public services (e.g. local law enforcement and emergency responders) as significant vulnerabilities. An additional two responses cited economic disparity as a significant risk. Four responses discussed information gaps – ranging from confusion regarding availability of recovery assistance to clear communication of evacuation and the status of utilities and roadways – before and after a disaster event as significant concerns in their communities. Finally, one response noted a need for assistance in relocating vulnerable communities, while another cited a need for additional green space.

## **III. Housing Stakeholder Discussion Worksheets**

Two of the 14 worksheet responses were specific to “housing stakeholders.” One cited the economic importance of coastal zone communities as a reason to promote housing options with an equal emphasis on rental housing and homeownership. It also cited the need to coordinate individual mitigation activities, like elevations, with larger-scale initiatives like coastal restoration. The other response noted an education gap in safe building practices as a vulnerability while also noting a need for new private investment.

## **IV. Local/Regional Government Stakeholder Discussion Worksheets**

Two of the 14 worksheet responses were specific to “local/regional government stakeholders.” One noted a general lack of understanding related to resilience “issues” and the need for “education of statewide efforts” as significant threats. Likewise, the response noted a need for greater coordination in regional government and planning efforts, specifically in coastal zone parishes. Finally, the response noted a need for additional housing options, transportation connectivity and water infrastructure. The second response outlined a lack of funding for public infrastructure and the state’s various regional planning commissions as issues inhibiting resilience.

## **V. Economic Development Stakeholder Discussion Worksheets**

One worksheet response was specific to “economic development stakeholders.” This response noted a perception that “big government” is responsible for economic development and noted a concern regarding the types of industries that may locate in Louisiana.

## **VI. E-Mailed Comments**

In addition to the above, two public comments were received via e-mail. The first, from Keilen Williams and signed as “Lower East Bank Residents of Pointealache, Davant, Bohemia, & Phoenix Louisiana,” noted the repetitive effects from hurricanes Katrina, Rita, Gustav and Ike along with the Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill. Specifically, this comment noted a need to support local fishermen and invest in vessels and equipment lost due to various disaster events.

The second e-mailed comment was from Joseph Carr of Social Action Initiatives. This comment noted the various challenges faced following Hurricane Isaac in St. John the Baptist Parish, and specifically the need for a single, user-friendly resource database that may be utilized in post-disaster environments. Mr. Carr also noted a lack of accessible information denoting disaster impacts on local resource and service providers. In recalling his post-Isaac experience, Carr noted, “One regional contact, a school special programs director, noted her sense that her health and social service staff delivered incorrect resource data, though confidently, to clients at least once out of three occasions.”

## **VII. State’s Response to Public Comments**

With respect to the 14 worksheet responses received, the state is confident the issues noted are directly aligned with the needs, risks and vulnerabilities noted in its Phase I NDRC application. Specifically, the application details an approach to develop programs and policies intended to strategically develop community infrastructure and diversify housing options in coastal zone areas. Additionally, through its extensive consultation efforts detailed throughout its application, the state has noted and is aware of cited information gaps and a need for further educational initiatives outlining resilience-building techniques.

Mr. Williams’ comment refers to a series of communities located along the east bank of the Mississippi River in Plaquemines Parish. Each of the communities cited is located outside of the federal flood protection system designed to mitigate disaster impacts in and around the New Orleans metropolitan area. The state has taken great care to articulate risk and vulnerability in this area throughout its application, and is aware and has noted the plight of local fishermen throughout the affected area. Mindful of the state’s need to protect, preserve and enhance local fisheries and its seafood industry, it has partnered with Louisiana Sea Grant in the preparation of its NDRC application. Utilizing this partnership, the state believes it has requisite outreach capacity and industry-specific expertise to develop and propose programmatic initiatives – both through the NDRC and outside of it – to address the continuing needs of this community.

Mr. Carr's comment mirrors OCD-DRU's own institutional experience in its various efforts to assist and facilitate the long-term recovery of St. John the Baptist Parish and other communities affected by Hurricane Isaac. In conjunction with the Louisiana Disaster Housing Task Force, OCD-DRU did contribute to the creation of such a resource following Isaac, but we remain interested in developing a more comprehensive product that may be utilized prior to, in the immediate aftermath of and during the long-term recovery of a disaster event. In response to his comment, the state has been in contact with Mr. Carr directly and will continue to explore options to develop such a product. If appropriate, the state may propose such a database in conjunction with its Phase II application.

Commentary on National Disaster Resiliency Competition (announcement).

I moved to New Orleans with my (Kenner native) wife in 1974 after finishing graduate school in Michigan, have lived and worked here in the N.O. region ever since. Now a 'mildly retired' clinical social worker (since 2007, and Metairie resident), I am living the early stages of a long time goal to work both clinically, and in the community!

(My) part-time work in community outreach consultant activities for the (JCOA) Jefferson Council on Aging's (ADRC) Aging and Disability Resource Ctr. regional support program began in 2008/9. This included providing marketing and related services to River parishes communities and their Councils on Aging, in Sts. Charles, James, and John the Baptist parishes. Benefits (to me) included 'learning' the larger neighborhoods and towns in the area, and their community health and social services agencies, both public and private.

(A particular lesson for me came with my ADRC supervisor's request for me to seek certification via AIRS, the national Alliance of Information and Referral Systems. I passed the exam for CIRS-A, only later to learn how rigidly developed and exclusive their resource taxonomy had become.)

After my position's work grant expired, I continued involvement with a River Parishes regional health service advocacy and insurance enrollment coalition. Though their funding later was also discontinued, Hurricane ISAAC soon after presented me new challenges and opportunities for more volunteer work, with the St. John Long Term Recovery Group's activities and (eventually its 'successor',) the St. John Citizens' Advisory Committee.

Early in my career I had soon noted that then-current urban resource contact and program information, frequently required digging around for, and/or single user data correction, often at times beyond available data from seldom-revised external directories. And I began to notice the typical agency's recurring tasks of internal data revisions, of favored client resource program and contact information. More recently I have been struck by noting the client, staff and related hidden costs of unintegrated and categorically limited resource compilations.

My growing awareness of community disasters and response has been broadened by personal, client and family/community experiences, & includes evacuations from Hurricanes George, Katrina (and lengthy recovery), and Gustav. Later I struggled through the processes of developing family, business and client-focused combination hurricane preparation/evacuation plans. (And now I confront at-risk community disaster prep and recovery educational and planning needs).

The year 2008 however began my introduction to the realities of both limited resources and widespread resource information gaps in rural /suburban areas. Little data was available routinely, much less after disasters and their impacts on area resource/service providers. After Katrina, landscape damage and loss of residence and traffic signage in various areas complicated even finding 'known' resources.

One regional contact, a school special programs director, noted her sense that her health and social service staff delivered incorrect resource data, though confidently, to clients at least once out of three occasions. Others recurrently note concerns with lack of appropriate resources. Without contact and service availability information, both solicited and compiled prior to impact, services could barely be inventoried, marshalled and communicated to the public after a disaster. Resource directories also are often narrowly conceived to include mostly/only non-profit and governmental organizations, while resources operated for profit or with at least sliding fee scale policies are tacitly seen as resource non-entities. And, if we don't know what we have, how can we economically consider and decide what we need ?

Since 2001, both my work in behavioral health, and my struggles with H. KATRINA's and ISAAC's impacts, have moved me to hold a more integrated view of the relationships of health and social resources, including especially community-wide education, and their influences on communities.

Hurricanes KATRINA and ISAAC brought home the region's struggles with impacted businesses, housing, floodwaters, drinking water, phones and e-mail and roadways and influence on families and neighborhoods. But what of other needs ?

The NDR Competition notes the likely value of resilience-building activities in heavily impacted areas, while lacking examples of such (. . . an invitation to creativity ?).

Some needs in St John's health and social service resources were gradually addressed in the two and a half years since ISAAC, though some were since decreased or withdrawn. I strongly lean toward thinking that 'needs assessments' remain partially or perhaps even primarily absent, as regards community-wide resident education on disaster preparation for BOTH sheltering-in and evacuation, a notion often confounded by storm-prep Guides, and return and recovery plans. The community needs safety and basic resource access in order to recover ! Furnishing information and education to support and to meet other needs are services required to sustain safety and to help residents cope with, tolerate and reduce stress as the community aims to recover at least pre-disaster levels of safety and basic resource availability. When and where and how do I/my family find what's needed ?

A Metairie resident since 1985, (and before a twice-flooded Orleans homeowner), I resisted needed home repairs (versus storm damages) after H. KATRINA due partly to inadequate and untrustworthy 'safety' information both delayed and (even that) finally offered by Corps of Engineers and parish and

state government. I saw many peers and colleagues move away. Being unsettled as to all the aspects of an unknown future living situation, as well as what current 'pre-disaster' family/community resource uncertainties exist, is a high stress load to the vast majority of disaster zone residents.

So, when area/regional health and social services professionals have minimally (or perhaps even less) networked, and developed both individual business and region-wide industry disaster preparation and collaborative community recovery support plans, I consider this evidence of a marked inability to address both the pre- and post-disaster needs of any community, typically and predictably avoiding the pain and uncertainties it faces. This seems the most important lesson I have learned recently, that avoidance, a critical symptom of PTSD, is an issue for communities as well as individuals, families and businesses.

Systematic gathering, offering and re-offering, sharing information, and seeking to comprehend the influence of our sharing, teaching and learning, and caring for the WHOLE community must be matched to levees, bridges, and the other projects needed.

The purpose of this activity was to get participants engaged by identifying and mapping unmet recovery needs, community development needs, and vulnerable populations in and throughout the State of Louisiana and Partner Parishes. Each map include a title, a brief blurb explaining the map and its corresponding, color-coded legend containing examples of what participants were being asked to identify on each map.

#### MAP #1 - UNMET RECOVERY NEEDS

DESCRIPTION: THE 2012 DISASTERS SEVERELY DAMAGED AREAS IN THE STATE. PARTICIPANTS WERE ASKED TO SHOW AREAS WHERE DAMAGE REMAINS.

#### *Legend/Explanation:*

Blue= People (Did a business close? Did people move away?)

Red= Houses (Are there abandoned houses, vacant lots, or houses that relate to unrepaired storm damage?)

Yellow= Infrastructure (i.e. Are there still damaged bridges, streets or sidewalks relating to the disasters? Was there damage related to flooding?)

Purple= Natural Resources (Where were trees, parks or opens spaces damaged? Where is there still damage?)

Green= Economic (Are there businesses that still haven't reopened? Are there areas where businesses have continued to struggle due to the disasters, i.e. from population shifts?)

#### *Activity Summary:*

A version of this map was created for each of the target areas. Participant responses were as follows:

##### St. John the Baptist Parish:

Blue = 1 instance in Laplace.

Red = Noted 6 times. Twice in Edgard, Twice in Reserve, Once in Pleasure Bend and once in Laplace.

Yellow = 7 recorded areas. Two instances in Garyville, Once in Reserve, twice in LaPlace and twice in Pleasure Bend.

Purple = 6 instances. Once in LaPlace, Once in Edgard, once in Garyville, once east of North Vacherie and once in Pleasure Bend.

Green = Documented in 6 areas. Once in LaPlace, twice in Edgard, once in Garyville, and twice east of Wallace.

##### Lafourche Parish

Blue = 7 identified instances. Most concentrated in Golden Head with 3 recorded instances. Also noted once west of Des Allemands, once southeast of Lockport, once in southern Larose, and once in Cutoff.

Red = Marked 6 times. Once, east of Cutoff; once, south of Larose; Once, east of Galliano, Once in Golden Head; Once, east of Lockport; and once between Kraemer and Des Allemands.

Yellow = Recorded 11 times. Once east of Kraemer, Once South west of Des Allemands, three times east of Lockport, Once south of Galliano; twice in Golden Head; twice, west of Grand Isle and once in an area north-west of Grand Isle.

Purple= Noted 6 times. Twice in Golden Head; Twice, west of Grand Isle; west of Galliano, once; and once east of Galliano.

Green= Indicated 8 times. Most concentrated around Golden Head with 5 areas identified. Also noted twice in areas to the west of Grand Isle and once in an area east of Lockport.

#### Plaquemines Parish

Blue = 4 instances noted in/around Point a la Hache.

Red= N/A

Yellow= N/A

Purple= N/A

Green= 1 area noted in Point a la Hache.

#### Terrebonne Parish

Blue = Indicated 11 times. 7 times along the border of Lafourche Parish. Remaining for instances were concentrated around Dulac.

Red = Recorded 11 times. 8 times along Lafourche border. 3 times in Dulac.

Yellow = Noted 10 times. 2 times along Lafourche border. 2 times southeast of Chauvin. 4 times on Terrebonne's barrier islands. 2 times in Dulac.

Purple = Documented 12 times. 4 times on barrier island region. 3 times southwest of Dulac. 2 times along Lafourche border. 3 times southeast of Chauvin.

Green= Chronicled 6 times. 2 times west of Dulac. 4 times along Lafourche border.

## MAP #2: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT NEEDS

DESCRIPTION: WHILE THE FIRST MAP IDENTIFIED MORE CENTRALIZED AREAS IMPACTED BY THE DISASTERS, THIS MAP RELATED MORE TO THE ENTIRE STATE. PARTICIPANTS WERE ASKED TO CATEGORIZE WHERE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT NEEDS EXIST THROUGHOUT THE STATE.

### *Legend/Explanation:*

Blue= People (Joblessness, disconnected residents, etc.)

Red = Properties (Blighted properties, abandoned homes/buildings)

Yellow = Natural Resources (Lack of Trees, Parks, and Open spaces)

Purple = Infrastructure (Drainage, Streets, Sidewalks, Bridges)

Green = Economic (Loss of business, loss of major employers, loss of customer base)

### *Activity Summary:*

A single map was created for this prompt. Participant responses are included below:

Blue= *People*: People related community development needs were identified twice during this exercise. Once in Plaquemines Parish and again in an area overlapping St. James and St. Charles Parishes.

Red = *Properties*: Indicated in two areas: Once in St. Charles Parish and again in Lafourche Parish (both along the St Charles- Lafourche Border).

Yellow = *Natural Resources*: Identified twice: Once in St. Tammany Parish and again in St. John the Baptist Parish.

Purple = *Infrastructure*: Noted once in St. Tammany Parish.

Green = *Economic*: This was the most broadly recorded indicator on this map. Identified cases in Terrebonne Parish, Lafourche Parish, Plaquemines Parish and St. John the Baptist Parish.

#### *Legend/Explanation:*

Blue = People (Children, Families, and the Elderly)

Red = Properties (Businesses, Parks, Homes)

Yellow = Natural Resources (Trees, Parks, Open Spaces)

Purple = Infrastructure (i.e. Drainage, Streets, Sidewalks, Bridges)

Green = Economic Resources (Local businesses, Small business owners).

#### *Activity Summary:*

Blue = People: Recorded 3 times. Once on the border of Lafourche and St. John the Baptist Parishes; Once in central St. John the Baptist Parish and again in Livingston Parish.

Red = Properties: 2 instances were noted. Identified once in Lafourche Parish and again in Livingston Parish.










# Predicted Future Flooding from a 100 Year Flood Event
