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Amendment Number 25 to State of Louisiana Action Plan for Disaster Recovery - Utilizing Funding from the Consolidated Security, Disaster Assistance, and Continuing Appropriations Act, 2009 (Public Law 110-329)

The State of Louisiana was allocated a total of \$1,093,212,571 for recovery from hurricanes Gustav and Ike.

Since the original submittal of the state's Disaster Recovery Action Plan to HUD on January 8, 2009, the state has received several approvals of subsequent Action Plan Amendments for program designed to receive CDBG disaster funds. This **Action Plan Amendment 25** is being submitted to HUD for approval of the reallocation of funds from the previously approved programs to the **Municipal Infrastructure** program and the **Economic Revitalization** program. The Louisiana Office of Community Development (OCD) is requesting to transfer funds from the *Allocation to Parishes to Municipal Infrastructure program*. The additional funds are intended to address the remaining unmet needs required to return these municipalities' infrastructure back to full operation, as well as implementing additional needed improvements to reduce the negative impacts from natural disasters. OCD is also requesting the reallocation of funds from the *Allocation to Parishes* program, the *Agriculture* program, the *Economic Development and Growth Infrastructure* program, the *Fishery Recovery* program, the *Comprehensive Resiliency* program, and the *Admin, Planning, and Technical Assistance* program to Economic Revitalization. The additional funds are intended to address the remaining unmet needs required to continue implementation of the comprehensive business recovery plan that addresses near and long-term capital needs and accelerate economic development.

This APA 25 is considered non-substantial because it does not create new programs, does not change eligible beneficiaries and is less than a 15% change in funding levels.

Gustav/Ike Action Plan Amendment 25: Reallocation of Funds from Allocation to Parishes program, the Agriculture program, the Economic Development and Growth Infrastructure program, the Fishery Recovery program, the Comprehensive resiliency program, and the Admin, Planning, and Technical Assistance program to Economic Revitalization program and Municipal Infrastructure program.

B. Agriculture Programs

The Agriculture Program is decreased to \$58,686,868.63 because funds have been de-obligated from activities that are completed and closed out. This program was created in Action Plan, Amendment 1 and last amended in Amendment 22.

C. Municipalities Infrastructure Program

The Municipalities Infrastructure Program will be increased to \$35,696,337.80. This program was created in Action Plan Amendment 3, and last amended in Amendment 24. The state continues to assess municipalities that are under-resourced in their ability to implement mitigation measures that harden their infrastructure and enhance the day to day well-being of their communities. Increased funds will further assist the state to support the mission of HUD to build more resilient communities, and fund the final eligible activity before closeout.

D. Economic Revitalization

The Economic Revitalization Program will be increased to \$69,620,125.21. This program was created in Action Plan Amendment 2, and last amended in Amendment 24. The state continues to implement a comprehensive business recovery plan that addresses near and long-term capital needs and accelerate economic development. Increased funds will further assist the state to support the mission

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of HUD to restore the State's overall economy, and fund the final eligible activity before closeout.

E. Economic Development and Growth Infrastructure Program

The Economic Development and Growth Infrastructure Program is decreased to \$79,336,536.47 because funds have been de-obligated from activities that are completed and closed out. This program was created in Action Plan, Amendment 4.

F. Fishery Recovery Program

The Fishery Recovery Program is decreased to \$33,555,555.85 because funds have been de-obligated from activities that are completed and closed out. This program was created in Action Plan, Amendment 1 and last amended in Amendment 22.

G. Comprehensive Resiliency Program

The Comprehensive Resiliency Program is decreased to \$12,923,624.85 because funds have been de-obligated from activities that are completed and closed out. This program was created in Action Plan, Amendment 3 and last amended in Amendment 24.

H. Admin, Planning and Technical Assistance

The Admin, Planning and Technical Assistance Program is decreased to \$53,745,555.78 because funds have been de-obligated from activities that are completed and closed out. This program was created in Action Plan, Amendment 1 and last amended in Amendment 23.
